EYFS	<p>In the EYFS all areas of learning and development are important and inter-connected. Expressive arts and design is a specific area through which the prime areas are strengthened and applied. At St John's we value individual expressions of creativity. Our focus on the process rather than purely on the product results in all children's work not looking the same. We aim to strike a balance between adult and child led activities.</p> <p>Expressive Arts and Design: The development of children's artistic and cultural awareness supports their imagination and creativity. It is important that children have regular opportunities to engage with the arts, enabling them to explore and play with a wide range of media and materials. The quality and variety of what children see, hear and participate in is crucial for developing their understanding, self-expression, vocabulary and ability to communicate through the arts. The frequency, repetition and depth of their experiences are fundamental to their progress in interpreting and appreciating what they hear, respond to and observe.
